She joined Debbie Mills and Gail's Anatomy to devote herself to making a difference year round.

Debbie founded Gail's Anatomy following the death of her daughter, Gail.

"When I lost my daughter, I had a choice," Debbie said. "I could grieve myself to death or I could make something positive out of this horrible experience. I chose to honor Gail by making a difference in ovarian cancer awareness. Gail's Anatomy learned first hand at the 2007 Relay that sharing the signs and symptoms of ovarian cancer needed to be more than just one night at the Relay For Life. Since that time, our campaign has expanded year-round. Family, friends and co-workers work tirelessly to make a difference."
